You will be judged by members of Ring 313 who will also be helping with the magic booth from 12-3.

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Past Events

President Leslie led the meeting with a coin transposition turning a coin into an oversized pocket watch. Tonight was reserved for showing and teaching effects that work best when standing or walking around. Members brought from their pockets magical ropes, rings, coins, and even "Instant impressions."

After President Leslie started the evening next up was **David Peltier** demonstrating the myriad possibilities with "linking ropes" instead of linking rings. Member Nate Kvetny advanced to the stage with an elaborate prop that looked all the world like a tiny house. When a spectator opened the front door to see what might be inside, the clever prop completely collapsed with wooden parts flying across the table. Kvetny followed up this piece with an illusion where he visibly tied the ends of three colored ropes (red, yellow, and green) to each other, yet when he completed his task instead of three colored rings he had only one ring all the ropes had been tied magically to each other.

SUDS shyly approached the stage and announced that he didn't bring a rope or a ring but he wanted to perform some impressions that might make us laugh. SUDS has been studying how some famous people walk. He presented his outrageous parodies of way of striding or walking that were hilarious. Bill Pearce followed SUDS on the platform, showing some of the methods to entertain using a ring and string where knots appear from thin air to capture a ring that appears to have a mind of its own. Our Sergeant at Arms, Jim Greene took the center stage showing several illusions using ropes that became confused in knots that defied explanation before falling apart as if they had just found their way home. Past President Kevin Brown advanced to the stage demonstrating coin penetrations and vanishes.

Jay Leslie made an encore performance demonstrating the devilish use of the "Ellis Ring." In one demonstration the spectator and the audience were mystified when what was apparently a simple ring vanished and reappeared while everyone watched. Clearly, the ring disappeared cleanly before its own "encore" appearance.

You have to train your ropes if you want your performance to be truly magical.
