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Meet member Ron Porter

Part 1 of 2 parts by Philip Henderson

Ron Porter is a southern California man all the way. Raised in Orange County he began his life in magic when he was only five years old. An older cousin built him a "square-circle"

and he was off and running. At age seven, Porter introduced himself to illusionist, *Chuck Jones*, telling him, "I'm a magician too!" Jones must have seen how serious the boy was and treated him as though he was a fellow magician. This support and encouragement at an early age was a clear signal that Porter could become a real magician.

In the fourth grade, Porter performed a magic show for his classmates, and shortly thereafter produced a magic show for his sister's birthday party. By the time he entered high school, performing magic was just a part of life. He had a part-time job at the Knott's Berry Farm magic shop showing close up magic to guests at Knott's. Jeff Martin, Steve Mattan, Ricki Dunn, Paul David, and Armando Lucero were among the magicians who helped him learn to perform. He also began performing at local Orange County restaurants. One of the most important lessons he learned from his mentor, Barryn Vaughn, is the admonition to *"treat your audience as if they are guests in your* home." Porter enjoys entertaining his audience. Instead of feeling superior or attempting to make fools of the audience, his performance is designed to put smiles on their faces and laughter to their hearts.

Despite performing magic for hundreds of audiences over the last forty years, Ron Porter describes himself as a shy person unless he is performing. He prefers to observe and watch others. This is perfect for his daytime work. Ron earned his doctorate degree in clinical psychology and for more than twenty years has tended to the residents at a local state developmental center as a clinical psychologist.

Most members of Ring 313 have met Ron's sons Ryan and Jason Porter. They are active members of the Ring's Junior magician's program. The boys are merely following the footsteps of their older sister Courtney. She is also a student of the entertainment industry, currently studying in New York City. The performing arts were well accepted in Ron Porter's family. In fact, his mother toured with the June Taylor Dancers, and his aunts were professional singers. This encouragement by family and the performers he met gave Porter the confidence to study and perform. Working at the Knott's Berry Farm store gave him the hours of practice required to hone his skills, and his years of performing in restaurants provided the much needed time in front of live audiences.

Ron Porter's favorite performers include close-up magicians Barryn Vaugh, Martin Nash, Paul David, and Al Goshman. Ron participated in Jeff McBride's Magic and Mystery School as a guest speaker teaching those in the healing arts how to use magic to help their patients. Porter recommends McBride's course and especially, The Mystery School Book © 2003 by Jeff *McBride and Eugene Burger*. This is a textbook for those interested in the development of an act and a career in magic. Porter also recommends Sleights of Mind © 2010 by Stephan L. Macknik and Susana Martinez-Conde (the writers are members of the Academy of Magical Arts, the Magic Circle, and IBM) for those interested in learning the neuroscience of magic. - 1. Who said, Ask an idiot?
- 2. Who said, Sometimes our bodies think better . . . try it . . . then do it!
- 3. Jugglers is an early name used to describe the work of magicians. When sporting men played the famous shell game, the movement of the shell was called Juggling, thus the person performing the work was called a Juggler.
- 4. Real magic occurs in the minds of the spectator. Our goal is to perform for the mind not for the ears and eyes. Magicians use the frail ability of a person's senses to give accurate and timely information about actions that occur in front of him. Sleight of hand takes advantage of the inability of a spectator to follow the small movement in the presence of the large movement. We fool the mind not the eve.
- 5. Jay Leslie was was mentored and coached in magic in the ancient method through the kindness and wisdom of the late Jim Swoger. Who is your mentor? Who are you mentoring?
- 6. We are eager to recruit more Junior Magicians to our Ring. If you have a son/daughter or grandchild who wants to learn the art, please bring them to our meetings! Our members are getting older . . . we need a youth movement!

Sylvester the Jester re-appeared again in Orange County with

re-appeared again in Orange County with his special brand of magical effects. Dan Sylvester made his third visit to Ring 313 and as usual, he had a full bag of creative ideas. Dan is a kind of Johnny Appleseed when it comes to magic. Instead of selling you a complete packet trick or a one-sized fits all effect, Dan discovers basic ideas that you can convert into your own special way of performing.

My English teachers insisted that it is incorrect to refer to someone as "very unique" because unique already means there is only one, so one cannot be "very unique". It is correct to say that each magical performer is unique because each of us has his own way to entertain an audience. However, when it comes to Sylvester the Jester, to say he is unique is an understatement.

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Dan's mind is constantly at work. Every object he sees can become a magical prop. He is a creative soul. Every time he gets his hands on a magical prop, he is compelled to dismantle it. He is intent on discovering a way to make the new object produce magical effects in the



minds of his audience. Dan is always asking "What if?" His opening statement set the tone for the evening's lecture. "*Magic is the only truth . . . everything else is false.*" This extreme position is the basis for the creative processes Danny uses to discover how to perform impossible illusions. Some of these illusions are "eye-popping," while others are "jaw-dropping."

Danny examines the world like a child would. He eagerly dismantles simple devices to discover the secrets they hold for a magician. Who would imagine that a pair of suspenders could provide cover for a "*magician's servante*?" Dan Sylvester did and look at his invention.

Danny sees magical opportunities everywhere. He is prepared to perform the necessary experiments to tease out the highest use of each tool. His ten-foot pole and enormous wooden mallet resulted from rigorous experimentation. Trial and error until finally . . . finally success. When Sylvester decided to transform his performing character into a human cartoon, he did not know how he would accomplish each effect. He was willing to take a risk. He was fearless. He was committed to working hard until success became the only option!
